# Thank You Eugene!

Neighborhoods, USA's (NUSA) 39th Annual Conference on Neighborhood Concerns, hosted by the City of Eugene, OR, was a smashing success with amazing feedback from the nearly 600 attendees.

Eugene shined in hospitality as out-of-town delegates routinely shared with organizers the warm reception they were getting from surrounding businesses and neighbors. Conference attendees patronized downtown establishments throughout the course of their time with pre-planned free time to explore the growing downtown.

Remaining consistent with Eugene's core values, all aspects of sustainability were woven into conference planning from meals that emphasized appropriate portions and locallysourced food, to a clearly articulated, sustainable procurement policy that was shared with vendors and exhibitors. Highlighting the area's award winning water, no single-serve water bottles were provided throughout the event as registrants were encouraged to bring their own reusable bottle, and, thanks to the conference venue's participation in Love Food Not Waste, more than 2.39 tons of recyclables and food waste were diverted from the landfill. Also in an unprecedented move for the NUSA conference, Eugene offered attendees the option of opting out of paper copies and instead provided online electronic access to conference material. More than 40% of attendees accepted the offer and opted out of printing.

While Eugene is one of the smallest municipalities to host the NUSA conference, everyone can be proud of the lasting impacts and legacy established as Eugene and NUSA move into the future.

Indianapolis' Hawthorne Center took home top honors during Neighborhoods, USA's 39th Annual Conference on Neighborhood Concerns for its Near West Collaborative Clean-Up project involving the Near West neighborhoods of Haughville, Hawthorne, We Care and Stringtown.

Going beyond a basic trash cleanup, which totaled ten truckloads, With over 200 residents and the help of an additional 400 volunteers, the Near West Collaborative also focused on other activities, that included:

- · Painting of over 50 fire hydrants
- Painting of Near West logo on street corners
- Mulching and sprucing up of Hawthorne Park, Stringtown Park and Rosalie Park
- Cleaning up a portion of the potential bike trail from Concord Street to Michigan Street
- Collecting and removing 10 truckloads of trash
- Planting of more than 50 trees in the Stringtown area
- Painting murals on bridges in the We Care Neighborhood

1st Place Project - Near West Collaborative Clean-Up

Hawthorne Center - Indianapolis, Indiana

The Near West Collaborative Clean-Up is the community-organizing arm of four neighborhoods. The collaborative structure is the link to the successful ability to build neighborhood capacity and to organize community around a plan. One of their largest objectives was a cleanup that hosted 400 volunteers and 200 residents. As part of the Great Indy Clean-Up, Near West provided four neighborhoods the opportunity to clean up 15 tons of trash, paint fire hydrants and plant 50 trees.

2nd Place Project: Fairmount Fosters Successful Schools - Fairmount Neighborhood Association (Fort Worth, Texas)

Fairmount's Foster Successful Schools initiative focused on several areas: Create an attractive entrance for the local neighborhood elementary school by improving landscaping, donating monies to help promote the formation of PTAs at the neighborhood schools, Increasing neighborhood involvement in the local schools through mentoring, and coordinating and implementing fund-raising activities to benefit the local schools.

3rd Place Project: Re-Envisioning of East 7th Street - Rose Park Neighborhood Association (Long Beach, California)

Born from a need to improve one of the oldest and most historic areas in Long Beach, the East 7th Street Collaboration brought together four neighborhood organizations with a mission to improve East 7th Street. Activities undertaken by the collaboration included increasing area identity with banners, installing pavers at intersections, implementing a cohesive tree design and planting, developing an overarching concept for the corridor, and working with local developers to ensure that revitalization efforts met the neighborhood needs and the historical style of the area.

Finalist Project: School Safety Brigade - CCW-STF Valenzuela Chapter Crime Watch (Quezon City, Philippines)

The School Safety Brigade, a project of the Citizens Crime Watch-Special Task Force, assist the local government school of Barangay Mapulang Lup and Apolonia F. Rafael Elementary School to ensure the safe and orderly flow of traffic while students are going to school and returning home. The project was prompted to be developed and prioritized due to previous reports of accidents involving students.

### Physical Revitalization/Beautification - Single Neighborhood



1st Place Project

South Shore Neighborhood (Chicago, Illinois)

Project: We Mean Green Neighborhood Peace Garden

A "positive loitering" campaign initiated by residents of Chicago's South Shore Neighborhood is bringing peace and civility to a blighted intersection through a positive outdoor activity. The We Mean Green Neighborhood Peace Garden and the Hospitality Garden are creating a peaceful, artful incentive to revitalizing a once vibrant street.

2nd Place Project: North Gateway Tacoma Theater District Project - New Tacoma Neighborhood Council (Tacoma, Washington)

The North Gateway Project was designed to provide artistic and environmental enhancements, pedestrian safety and serve as another distinctive amenity for the Theatre District. Activities included: hosting a garage sale; completion of the Ben Gilbert Park and Mural; funding of an area clean-up; creation and implementation of fund raising events; creation and distribution of a "Walkable Urban Project Survey; hosting of several community events; and creation and dedication of a large wall mural.

3rd Place Project: Lowden Tunnel Mural - South Hemphill Heights Neighborhood Association (Fort Worth, Texas)

After years of neglect, the Lowden Tunnel Mural project was undertaken to combat "tagging" and graffiti, allow residents to safely use the Tunnel, and improve the appearance of the neighborhood. The project brought together a local artist, local school children, city staff and neighborhood volunteers to create a neighborhood focal point that not only improves the appearance of the neighborhood, but also provides a safe avenue for those enjoying healthy outdoor activity.

Finalist Project: Creek Clean Up Events -Tahquitz Creek Yacht Club (Palm Springs, California)

Once a neighborhood recreation area, the Tahquitz Creek was dammed due to flash floods in the creek. The creek then became a haven for illegal dumping activities. In 2006 local neighborhood organizations met to address the neglect around the creek and a clean-up event was created to revitalize the area around the creek. The clean-up was successful and is held annually every year. What was an eyesore is now a community asset.

### 2014 NEIGHBORHOOD OF THE YEAR AWARDS

#### Social Revitalization/Neighborliness - Single Neighborhood



<u>1st Place Project</u> - The Taste of Milpas Milpas Community Association - Santa Barbara, California

The Milpas Community Association produced the first-ever Taste of Milpas in 2013 as a way to bring people into their community; introduce people to their wonderful restaurants, and raise funds for their annual Holiday Parade while also supporting its local are non-profits that work with youth.

2nd Place Project: Creating a Neighborhood Association Dream Team - Parkwood Neighborhood Association (Shoreline, Washington)

Parkwood's project began with the creation of a new neighborhood association - Parkwood Neighborhood - and included several activities to address local issues, create a sense of community and become civically engaged with local government. Activities included: hosting neighborhood and fund raising events; development of neighborhood goals; creation of a neighborhood newsletter, Facebook page and web site; and increasing engagement in local government.

3rd Place Project: Tots Rock - Windom Community Council (Minneapolis, Minnesota)

The Windom Community began to see younger families moving into the neighborhood and wanted an event that could unite these families in a social setting. The concept behind Tots Rock is a dance party for children ages 6 months to years of age. In addition to dancing to a live D.J., the event features a "chill" room with books, a craft and coloring station and bean bags for lounging. The variety of activities keep children engaged and entertained while giving parents the opportunity to meet other parents in the community.

#### 2014 BEST NEIGHBORHOOD PROGRAM AWARDS



1st Place Projects (tie):

Creative Journey - Columbia, South Carolina Henderson Mediation Program - Henderson, Nevada

For the first time in the history of NUSA's Best Neighborhood Program Award, there was a tie for first place.

The Creative Journey program began in January 2013 to help returning soldiers suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder and traumatic brain injury. By working with and helping veterans

perform various types of art projects, the program helps recovering soldiers and their families improve wellness and build better lives.

Henderson's Mediation Program provides free community mediation services to neighbors in convenient, neutral locations. The program focuses exclusively on community disputes like noise, animals, property issues, landlord/tenant relations and other items. This creative solution to resolve disputes offers residents an opportunity to improve the quality of life and promote neighborhood connectivity.

3rd Place Project: Neighborhood Picnic and Community Expo - Palm Springs, California

Began in May 2008, the Neighborhood Picnic and Community Expo, was organized with the goal to bring people together and celebrate Palm Springs neighborhoods and the great things happening that make Palm Springs such a wonderful place to live, work and play. The picnic if held each spring, and exhibitors are invited to participate and provide information about their products, programs and services. In 2013 more than 800 people attended the event.

4th Place Project: Identification Blade Sign Program - Palm Springs, California

In 2006, Palm Springs Neighborhood Involvement Committee created a program to visually identify City neighborhood organizations by mounting neighborhood "blade signs" onto existing street signs. Each sign is rectangular in shape and has peaks cut into the top to represent the profile of the 11,000 foot Mount San Jacinto. Neighborhoods, certified by the City, can design and purchase the signs through a single source vendor.

Finalist Project: Youth Going Green Community Garden - Houston, Texas

In December 2008, Almighty Ministries, Inc. became the owner of a vacant lot littered with weeds, broken concrete and dying trees. Efforts to revitalize the lot began in 2011 when the property became a garden for the youth in the neighborhood, providing youth with gardening skills, encouraging youth to eat healthier and supplying households with fresh produce. In 2012 fund-raising began to purchase materials for a fence to secure the garden and by November 2013, with over 146 hours of volunteer work, the fence was completed.

Finalist Project: Occupy Medical - Eugene, Oregon

Occupy Medical started as a humble first aide tent at the Occupy Eugene site in 2011. A handful of medically trained volunteers began to serve the movement with their specialized skills. As people learned that Occupy Medical was there to treat patients and not to judge, the client load increased. After the City shut down the Occupy Eugene camp, Occupy Medical began offering weekly free clinics. To date Occupy Medical serves approximately 30 patients a week.
